



1968 White California Special, 1972 Green Convertible, 2015 Red Coupe



How I came to love Mustangs is actually kind of a funny story. I was born into a Chevrolet family with 1 odd ball Mopar Uncle. Needless to say Ford was a

dirty word in my family. Like most kids I started saving money for my first car around 14 years old cutting grass, chores, birthday and Christmas money, etc. My dream car was a first generation Camaro but by the time I was ready to get my license I had only saved up \$700 which even in 1984 wouldn't touch a decent Camaro (or a cool Mustang for that matter).

My aunt's friend had a 1972 plain jane, 3 speed manual, 351 4V Mustang coupe no options car and we went to look at it. I instantly fell in love with the oddball Clydesdale. I thought it looked like a 1st gen Camaro in the front with a 68-77 Corvette back window. My father and I checked it out and he felt it was a sound car and agreed to loan me \$300 to purchase the \$1000 car and that was all she wrote.

My junior year in HS was filled with smokin' tires and smokin' Chevys. Sadly I only made it 9 months before wrecking it, but the Ford bug had bitten me. Since then I have owned four 1st gen Broncos, a 1997 Mustang, a 2014 Mustang which got traded immediately for the 2015 GT Premium 5.0 with IRS.

In 2006 when I decided I wanted a cool old classic

car it had to be a convertible version of the first car I ever owned. I found the rust free car in Hollywood, California., trailered it home



and went to work on it. I have done or had done by others a ton of work on it and 11 years later it is nearly finished (because you never really finish these old classics).

The California Special was an impulse buy, I was actually looking at a '69 Mach 1 fastback when I came across it. But the CS has been 1 of my favorite Mustangs since High school too and it should be a pretty fun project along with my '65 T'bird. But if the price is right any of these cars are for sale. Someday I'll have my '69 Mach 1!

Informational Article: Celebrating the Mustang One Owner's Story

As I was contemplating what to write about for this month's article I was considering my options. It is the 25th Anniversary for the club but I have already used that history. And then I thought, April 17th is National Mustang Day, so I could tell that story but how many Mustang owners don't know that history? (let me know if I am wrong and that will be something for the future.) Well, after a little hot chocolate (I always think better after chocolate.) It came to me. Bill Norman is a founding member and he has had an early Mustang and I'll bet that would be an interesting story. And sure enough it was. I asked and Bill delivered.

Here is the Bill's Mustang story.



I bought my first Mustang, a 1965 Honey Gold coupe, six cylinder three speed, while I was stationed at Fort Hood, TX. It was early/mid 1965. I

drove it until the unit I was in received orders overseas to Viet Nam the latter part of 1965. I placed it in storage until my return to the States in early/mid 1967 when I was assigned to Fort Ord, CA.

I drove the "65 Mustang for a while until I was on my way to visit relatives in Modesto, and on my way there, I saw a billboard advertising Mustangs in Hayward, CA so I decided to swing in and see what they would give me for my "65. I saw a red GT/CS on the showroom floor and liked the style, but not the color, so the salesperson said they had more out back and they did,

a foot and I said that is the color I would like. It turns out they had just rotated the showroom cars and it had just been washed. After I took it for a drive I found out I really liked it. The only thing I wanted was a tach but the salesperson said it didn't come with one in the dash, but there was a hood tach just coming out and I could order it if I wanted it. Which I did.

So, the hood tach is part of the original equipment on my "68 California Special. This was in the April/May 1968 timeframe and the cost was right around \$4,000.00 and the dealership gave me around \$1,200.00 for my "65. I continued my trip to the relatives and they were quite sur-



prised to see me with my new Mustang.

Then mid/ late 1969 one of the

soldiers in my unit received orders to ship out and he had a red 1968 Mustang coupe with a black vinyl top which had been in the middle of an accident so the hood and trunk were bent. He offered to sell it to me since I had a Mustang, but I said I really didn't need it.

Then he said I could have it for \$250.00 and I couldn't pass that up, as it was still drivable. I managed to remove the hood and flatten it out some to make it easier to see. My dad came down to the

area on business and I let him drive it while he was there and told him to take it back to Washington when he returned home.

I left the Army early 1970 and came home to Graham, WA, where my folks lived. My dad had driven the red "68 home and used it to commute to Ft Lewis where he worked. He forgot to check the oil, so the engine locked up on him and it was towed back home where it sat. I was rather unhappy about it, because I was going to have it restored. So, I exchanged parts at the Mustang Ranch for work on my GT/CS over the next few years.

Later in 1970 I re-enlisted in the Army and drove my GT/CS to and around the various duty stations until my retirement in 1987. Shortly after my retirement, I took my GT/CS to the Mustang Ranch to let them do a restoration to show quality which they did.

In early 1965 I had the opportunity to purchase a white 1993 Mustang LX from Enterprise Rent-

al. This gave me a daily driver and let me use my '68 to show, although I did take the '93 to a few.

Then as 1999 was wrapping up I traded the '93 in on my Bright Atlantic Blue 2000 Convertible

which I currently still have. My 1968 GT/CS California special has



When I asked him why

he chose the Mustang, he said he liked the look and the price.

From Mustang Times, March 2017

This is of course the 50th Anniversary of the Shelby GT500. The limited edition Shelby Super Snake will

be uncaged in April according to Gary Patterson, president of Shelby American.

In an article in the <u>Mustang Times</u> by John Clor, there is a new initiative at Ford to "validate the key role that enthusiasts play for Ford Motor Company. He says it will be a "big deal" and that details will be out within the first quarter of 2017. I for one am anxious to hear more about it.

Also, in articles by Donald Farr, editor of the <u>Mustang Times</u> and in John Clor's article, the rumor is no longer a rumor. By 2020, Ford will have a Mustang Hybrid with V8 power. 2018 will see the elimination of the V6 (replaced by the Ecoboost) and 2 years later the line-up will be GTE (Enhanced), V8, and Mustang Hybrid.

In the <u>Mustang Times</u> as well was a great chart comparing the styling of the 2015 with the new 2018. Personally, I thought this was very cool. Now maybe even I can start to identify the years of our great Stangs based on these styling differences.

for over 200 different types of cars.

It was inspiring, to be standing with this large group as he explained everything from design to shipping to tooling. They build their own tools specific for their work and the tables that sup-



port the process. The talent and dedication of people working for Art was fascinating to hear about including that many of the people in this organization have worked there for over

20 years. He spoke of the enormous talent of the young people in the organization and the new tech-

nology they have incorporated into the work. He showed us several pieces that were copied on their 3D printer to fit perfectly in whatever frame was being built. We got to see a large piece of steel being bent to form part of a new frame.

All there seemed to enjoy the information, tour and the man.

Thank you Art for taking time to walk us through the facility. It was clear that he enjoyed the

work and the people he worked with and appreciated both.

After leaving, we went a few blocks up the

Griot's Garage Tech Day

"I can see clearly now..." where I can spend and spend! What a great Tech Session we had at Griot's Garage on this rainy day. Jason, from Griot's, did a great job of explaining the process from wash to



wax and explaining the products Griot's has to take you through the process. He also taught us how to use those products and how the new compare to the old.

Shari, also from Griot's, helped us to get set up and even put together a display to use in the photos. They al-

lowed us to use their back room so that after the class we could chat about what we learned, how we did our own cars, and what we bought or needed to buy. (Yes, I saw those Griot's bags leaving the store and honey, was that <u>MY</u> purse you were getting into?)



Here are a few tips that I walked away with.

Machine Polishing Guide

- 1. Wash and Dry Vehicle
- 2. Clay / Surface Prep Vehicle
- 3. Polish / Correct Paint Issues
- 4. Wax / Protect Paint

I asked Jason to explain his entire process in general steps. What he does:

- 1. Wash tires / wheels first (although I have heard do this last as well)
- 2. Clean door jams
- 3. Wash entire car
- 4. Clay
- 5. Polish and Wax: Step 1— orange foam pad with correcting cream (which one is determined by the level of correction needed), Step 2— Finishing Sealant with black foam finishing pad, and Step 3—Your choice of wax (poly wax for daily drivers or carnuba wax for that rich shine)
- 6. Clean all the edges, hiding places
- 7. Some say wash again. Jason says everything wipes off well so you shouldn't need to do this.

Some of the new products:

- Claying mitt—lasts longer, is washable, and a lot faster—it is more expensive initially
- Various levels of polishing products that replace if desired the onestep product from before (still selling it)
- New orbitals (machine polishing / waxing larger orbital distance especially for deeper scratches.
- New towels for various parts of the process

I have probably missed some but those are a few.



If you are interested, you may set up an appointment and they will give you a free class, one-on-one with some time for your own practice. Hank loaned us his car today as a demo. Now he gets to go home and complete the job!

Whatever products you use, this was a great learning experience for these products and care for that gorgeous car in general. I see detailing almost as "therapy" (Jerry's word for it). I enjoy the process. And just incase any of those great club minds are working......NO I won't do yours! Contrary to popular belief, I don't need that much therapy!
